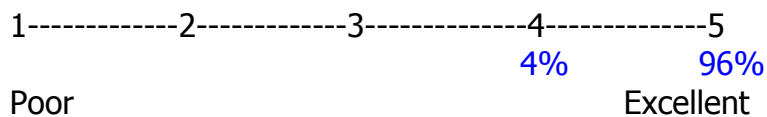

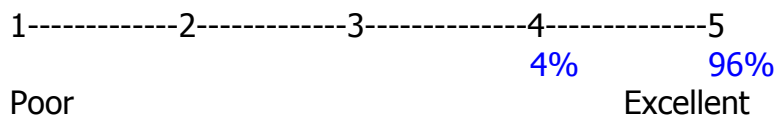
Your child has participated in *the **KIDZ Have Rights*** training program, developed by the Body Safety Steering Committee of Kent County and you observed this presentation.

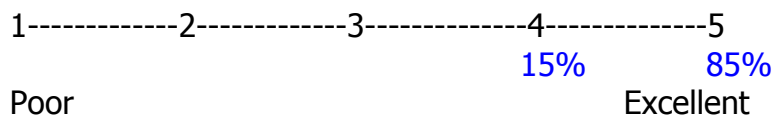

- Enforcing the fact that a safe adult must be told.
- The information was presented in a way the kids could understand—allowed to participate.
- That this does spark the conversation between kids and parents.
- Talking about the different types of touching and who can or can not touch.
- I think that it was valuable to have them list people that they could go to in a number of settings.

- Describing the different touches and the feelings that go with them.
- I like that we were invited to sit in so we could follow up at home with any unanswered questions.
- I think the video was excellent.
- Getting the topic out in the open and talking about the selfish touches. This helps take the power and taboo out of the “secret” or threat. This also lets the kids learn it is ok to talk about this.
- Giving kids the self confidence to know what’s right/wrong and being able to talk about it openly and honestly.
- The education of all students on this issue is so important.
- Reinforcement of it not being their fault—it wasn’t embarrassing for the kids.
