As I reflect on my first year as CEO of the Center, I continue to be humbled by the dedication of our team and partners, who show up each and every day to do this work. Together, we have faced challenges, celebrated successes, and most importantly, provided support and services for children impacted by sexual abuse. I would like to share a few highlights from the the past year and share what is coming next:

**Reintroduction of onsite medical examinations:** These exams are an essential part of the healing process for children who have experienced sexual abuse. By providing these services within the comforting and familiar walls of our Center, the emotional burden that can come with navigating multiple unfamiliar environments is minimized.



**Enhanced mock courtroom:** A mural, depicting a jury, now transforms the space into a more realistic environment helping children feel prepared and confident as they engage with the legal system. Watching a child find their voice, in the face of daunting circumstances, is a powerful reminder of the critical role we play in supporting them through their journey to justice.

MDT Orientations: Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) Orientations were launched in 2024. This training familiarizes partner agency staff with the Center and emphasizes the critical role of collaboration among MDT partners. Materials are tailored for new detectives, caseworkers, and other agency staff, offering a chance to see firsthand how each service we provide integrates into the larger multidisciplinary response.

Implementation of Key Performance Indicators (KPIs): By tracking and analyzing data, we can assess our progress, identify opportunities for growth, and ensure we are delivering the highest quality of services. These metrics not only keep us grounded in our mission but also provide a clear vision for the road ahead.

We know that the work of healing and justice does not stop at the walls of the Center. We will continue to focus on increasing the awareness of child sexual abuse prevention and intervention. At the same time, we will deepen our engagement with vital partners in the community to ensure a seamless and effective response happens for every child we serve.

Creating a community where children are safe, supported, and empowered requires the collaboration of not only the multidisciplinary team, but the entire County. Every individual, organization, and community member plays a crucial role in fostering an environment where our children can thrive. I hope you will join us.

# **Building Trust. Inspiring Hope. Empowering Community.**

Since our inception, we have supported over 25,000 children and families through our one-of-a-kind multidisciplinary approach. The Children's Advocacy Center of Kent County opened its doors in 1993 to serve suspected victims of child sexual abuse. For the past three decades, the Center has helped to minimize trauma, by providing a space where a child has access to every service they may need and where they only have to tell their story once.

To support children and families impacted by sexual abuse, we combine the efforts of a multidisciplinary team (MDT) to build trust and provide life changing services that promote hope and healing, while seeking justice. In Kent County, our MDT consists of partnerships with 10 law enforcement agencies, Children's Protective Services, the Kent County Prosecutor's Office, and the YWCA. It also comprises our internal team of forensic interviewers, therapists, and advocates.




